

Your Pathway to a Medical Career



A unique university and hospital partnership is set to prepare and launch aspiring doctors into their future medical career; in regional Queensland.

The first students commenced in the Wide Bay and Central Queensland in 2022 under the new Regional Medical Pathway – formalised in 2021 between CQUniversity, The University of Queensland, and Wide Bay and Central Queensland Hospital and Health Services.

Designed for school leavers, students will complete a three-year Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine) course with CQUniversity, before moving into UQ's four-year Doctor of Medicine program.

Wide Bay Hospital and Health Service Chief Executive Debbie Carroll said the partnership offered a game-changing approach to medical training. "The pathway will improve access for regionally based students and will ensure more doctors are trained regionally — and importantly, stay regionally once they enter the profession." Ms Carroll said.

Director of Medical Academic Development Professor Alan Sandford said the pathway would also help address the difficulties in attracting and retaining doctors in regional, remote and rural areas.

"Medical workforce shortages exist in regional areas across Australia and around the globe. I'm confident this partnership will help us to improve medical workforce sustainability and, in turn, health outcomes for patients in our regions, plus provide rich careers for Doctors working in the region." Prof Sandford said.

As part of the partnership, WBHHS will provide students with practical learning opportunities through placements, internship opportunities

and postgraduate training places within the Wide Bay Hospital and Health Service including Bundaberg, Hervey Bay, Maryborough and rural facilities.

Applications for entry into the CQUniversity Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine) course are now open. In addition to general admission, there will also be a pathway available for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.

Upon successful completion of the course within three years, and with a Grade Point Average of 5.0 or more, students will gain direct entry into UQ's Doctor of Medicine program from 2025.

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Patients are prepared for discharge home after their day surgery procedure. Patients receive light refreshments and the our nursing staff discuss discharge information about medications and wound care with the patient.

Our Surgical Ward

We have 8 in-patient beds, consisting of single and double rooms for our patients who require more than just day surgery. Our qualified Nursing staff provide a high standard of care, following clinical care pathways which are in line with best practice principles and guidelines, optimising positive patient outcomes.

We offer clinical placement for medical and nursing students from University and Tafe, providing them with support and learning opportunities for their training and potential future employment.

Sterilizing Department

Our modern Sterilization Department includes the latest technology in the tracking of surgical instruments through the use of tiny barcodes etched onto the surgical instruments. This automated tracking system of surgical instruments and equipment improves infection control monitoring and provides meaningful data for providing continuous improvement and improved clinical outcomes.



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
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Health Workforce Queensland
