### Townsville University Hospital

### Dr Mikaela Seymour

### Townsville Tropical Public Health Unit, Queensland Health

Dr Mikaela Seymour is an AFPHM trainee working in Townsville, with a passion for global health, health equity and the Pacific region. She was the Aerial Health Patrol outreach doctor where she lived in remote villages of Western Province, providing primary care, public health, and communicable disease control. During COVID-19 she was the primary physician responsible for the rollout of vaccines in this region, despite the absence of roads or electrification, and achieved the second-highest vaccine rate in the country (behind only the capital district). In 2022 she was seconded to the PNG Institute of Medical Research and the Eastern Highlands Public Health Unit under the Australian Regional Immunisation Alliance DFAT program. For her work in promoting health equity in the immediate region, she was awarded the Junior Doctor of the Year in 2018, Queensland Young Achiever in Health Care in 2022, and Forbes 30 under 30 Asia for community impact. She continues to advocate for equitable access to basic services to the remote majority in the Indo-Pacific region.



### Dr Emma Sganzerla

Dr Emma Sganzerla is a final-year Geriatric Medicine and General Medicine Advanced Trainee, working at the Townsville University Hospital. Dr Sganzerla graduated from James Cook University in 2013, before completing basic physician training and commencing advanced physician training in Townsville. After a two-year stint at The Prince Charles Hospital in Brisbane, she is now back working at the Townsville University Hospital, where she hopes to remain when she obtains her fellowship.
